Cultural Arts & Enrichment College Tour

In 2023, Franklin Wright Settlements proudly continued its tradition of offering a transformative College Tour experience to students, marking over two decades of commitment to higher education access. This year's tour took participants on a journey through the Northeastern United States, visiting prestigious institutions such as Princeton, Yale, Rutgers, Columbia, and the City College of New York, among others. For nine days, students had the opportunity to explore campus life, engage with faculty and students, and envision their future academic endeavors.

The College Tour program, provided at no cost to participants, aims to inspire and empower students from vulnerable backgrounds to pursue higher education. Recognizing that many families lack the resources to visit colleges, Franklin Wright Settlements offers this invaluable experience to motivate and guide students towards a brighter future. The impact of the program speaks volumes, with an astounding 95% of participants enrolling in institutions of higher learning, 85% earning undergraduate degrees, and 47% pursuing graduate studies.

Originally conceived as a response to the challenges faced by foster children and African-American males at risk of falling into cycles of poverty and incarceration, the College Tour has evolved into a beacon of hope and opportunity for students living in severe poverty. For many participants, the tour represents their first time leaving the city of Detroit, opening doors to a world of possibilities beyond their immediate surroundings.

At its core, the College Tour embodies Franklin Wright Settlements' mission to guide children and families from crisis to self-sufficiency, breaking the cycle of generational poverty one student at a time. Through this transformative experience, participants are empowered to envision and pursue a future filled with educational attainment, personal growth, and success.

Family Growth & Development



Family In-Home Reunification

The FWS Family In-Home Reunification program has made a significant impact on reuniting children and families. This comprehensive initiative involves master-level clinicians delivering court-mandated, home-based individual and family therapeutic services. The primary objective is to reunify families while enhancing their overall functioning.

Virtual Therapy

This initiative provides mental health services to southeast Michigan residents directly or indirectly affected by COVID-19. The goal is to help community members alleviate symptoms of depression and anxiety, facilitating a return to an improved level of functioning.

Food Pantry & Distribution

Franklin Wright offers a weekly food pantry and free food distribution program every Monday, providing essential groceries to individuals and families in need. Our pantry is stocked with nutritious items generously donated by local partners, ensuring that everyone in our community has access to wholesome food options.

Spirit of Brown — Feeding the Homeless

Throughout the year, Franklin Wright actively engages in providing hot meals, fruit, snacks, water, warm blankets, hygiene kits, safe sex kits, clothing, and more to community members experiencing homelessness. Staff and volunteers prepare fresh, homemade hot meals and assemble toiletry bags, ensuring support for over 200 people. Donations from volunteers and Chase Bank, including hats and gloves, contribute to the success of this crucial community event.

Warming Center

Located at our Charlevoix facility, Franklin Wright hosts a Warming Center for individuals without shelter or heat during the cold months. The center offers access to blankets, free food, and additional support services.

Community Closets

Both of our locations feature community closets where residents can "shop" and take home items such as suits, interview attire, everyday clothing, accessories, as well as home items like sheets and blankets.

Substance Abuse Counseling

Franklin Wright plays a significant role in addressing the opioid epidemic. Our counselors actively engage with youth and adults, educating them on the dangers of drug initiation and the progression to Fentanyl use. Treatment options are discussed for those already using drugs.

EMBRACING RESILIENCE: A JOURNEY THROUGH TRAUMA AND TRIUMPH

My name is Kierra. I'm 33 years old with a one-year-old baby girl. I have experienced the loss of both of my parents, my son, and many more loved ones. I went through some very traumatic and life-changing experiences, but I overcame them with the help of my amazing therapist, redirection, prayers, and walking by faith. I still have some days where emotions are everywhere, but who doesn't? The biggest part of my success is that I never gave up!

My advice for other people is to never be afraid or embarrassed to get help. We all need a mental break. Don't let yourself get to the breaking point where it's too late. The ways I cope with mental health are coloring, drawing, journaling, listening to music, taking some self-care days, and going to work! Never be afraid to tell your story; you never know who it could help.

Pathways to Hope

The Out-of-School Time (OOST) Program is dedicated to creating a enjoyable and secure environment for youth aged 6-18. Here, children can learn, grow, and engage in a variety of educational activities encompassing academic enrichment, Social and Emotional Learning (SEL), life skills, and career readiness.

Our philosophy revolves around providing productive spaces for youth during non-school hours, aiming to deter them from engaging in negative behaviors. Our objective is to nurture youth by equipping them with skills, resources, and support to bridge the achievement gap and navigate challenges like peer pressure.

Youth enjoyed a variety of enrichment classes throughout the year, including The Glam Doctor, which teaches self-love, self-esteem, confidence, and social-emotional learning

Collaborating with community partners such as the United Way for Southeastern Michigan and the Grow Detroit's Young

Talent (GDYT) initiative, we offer enrichment activities and support services in conflict resolution, mentoring, and career exploration.

After School Enrichment Program (ASEP)

ASEP is a comprehensive student success program tailored to uplift under-represented urban youth aged 5 – 18. With over 64,000 service hours dedicated to enrichment programming, students evolve through mentoring, tutoring, academic enrichment, life skills, social skills enhancement, and conflict resolution.

Summer Enrichment Program (SEP)

This day camp-like initiative mirrors ASEP's enrichment programming but extends for longer durations. Students participate in weekly or bi-weekly field trips aligned with the curriculum, exploring music technology & production, yoga & meditation, digital media &

technology, STEM, home economics, arts & culture, and more.

Grow Detroit's Young Talent (GDYT)

GDYT is a citywide, six-week summer jobs program for Detroit youth aged 14-24. Participants gain valuable onthe-job training experience and follow a curriculum covering various career fields, career assessments, financial literacy courses, and the identification of areas of career interest.

Community Outreach

Community Garden Revitalization:


